

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FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

Greetings! The sun is high and warm, the first signs of spring are upon us, and it feels absolutely fantastic! It has been a brisk winter, a winter like the winters of yesteryear (or at least of the late 1990s). Despite the cold, and with your wonderful support and with the help of other invaluable local partners and landowners, our all-volunteer board has used these cold, dark months to plan several major initiatives for the summer ahead.

We intend to complete the final phases of the Cripple Creek Habitat Restoration Project this summer. Look for major culvert work at Chena Spur Road, near Water Wagon. Once this has been completed, Cripple Creek will return to its historic channel, providing Chinook salmon with much needed local habitat. For supporting us in this endeavor, we would like to thank our partners, the Conservation Fund, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, and DOWL Engineering, as well as the Fairbanks Soil and Water Conservation District and their Youth for Habitat Program. All of these groups have made immeasurable contributions to the success of this project. Thank you!

We also continue to have great community support for our Goldstream Greenbelt Initiative. This summer, we hope to acquire the last of three critical wetlands and trails parcels near the Blueberry Preserves. Securing title to these 120 acres means that we will be able to fill a large gap in the Goldstream Greenbelt, conserving habitat, greenspace, and recreation opportunities in perpetuity. We are very happy that this parcel is valued and enjoyed as much as it is. Look for more developments and opportunities to volunteer to help with this initiative on our Facebook page later this summer.

Thanks to you and to all our members, these achievements and many more are possible.

2020 is already looking to be a very busy year, and we need your help more than ever. If you're interested in getting involved in any of these projects, please let us know. Fairbanks is a wonderful community, and we enjoy working with you, and all of our partners.

Here's wishing you and yours a healthy, warm, and dry (but not too dry) Interior summer.

PARCEL SPOTLIGHT: STEFFENSEN & DIX

Our newest acquisition is a critical 120-acre area that connects the east and west halves of conserved land in Goldstream Valley. This parcel was owned by Frank Steffensen and his sister, Christina Dix, and it contains ¾ of a mile of Goldstream Creek and its buffering riparian areas. It preserves the scenic value of Ballaine Road and opens up numerous opportunities for the community to use trails, watch migratory birds, and conduct education programs and research.

After traveling to Alaska with her family in their station wagon in 1958, Frank and Christina's mother purchased the property in the mid-1960s. They frequently visited from out of state. Between roughly 1985 and 2005, Frank lived in a dry cabin on one of the parcels, watching the forest mature while observing a steady increase in summer bird populations. Both Frank and Christina value having the parcel's wetlands and green space conserved, and they see the existing winter trail as a valuable resource for the community to enjoy. This is an extremely important area for the continuity of habitat and trails in Goldstream Valley. ◆





TRAIL THOUGHTS

We often take trails for granted in Fairbanks. For many of us, being able to walk out our doors and onto a neighborhood trail for our daily escape is one of the most important facets of life here. What we don't always realize is that many of these trails are not permanently protected.

One of the best examples is the trail crossing our newly-acquired parcels adjacent to Ballaine Road (Steffensen and Dix). These properties host one of the main, arterial trails crossing Goldstream Valley. Before our agreement to purchase those parcels was finalized last summer, most trail users likely didn't know they were only able to use that trail thanks to the generosity of its previous owners. If they had put up a "No Trespassing" sign, then that trail would have been immediately closed. If the property had been sold to a developer, then the trails may have been lost forever. Thanks to the generous support of our members and sustaining donors, IALT acquired the Steffensen and Dix parcels last year and therefore preserved this vital trail corridor in Goldstream Valley. Preserving critical junctions in public green spaces is a priority for us at the Land Trust. If trails are an important part of your life in Fairbanks, please consider making a donation to IALT today.

Without your financial support, these acquisitions would not be possible. The IALT board feels a new sense of urgency related to another private property in the Cripple Creek watershed that contains a popular trail. The property is vulnerable to imminent development. We're in discussions with the owner and are beginning to fundraise. Please stay-tuned for updates. ◆

CHINOOK CONSERVATION PARK

New 2-mile trail loop in Chinook Conservation Park

On June 1, IALT partnered with REI and community volunteers to build a one mile walking trail along the historic Cripple Creek channel (see map). Despite the heavy rain, we loaded ourselves up with various tools and set to work. We made great time clearing a path, while also having a great time. This walking trail is to be expanded during this summer and the next, with a bridge or two for ease of access to the western half of this 90-acre parcel.

To celebrate this new trail and opt outside on Black Friday, IALT led a snowshoe hike using equipment generously donated by REI. We had around 20 participants and packed a fantastic snowshoe trail. In addition to our goals to increase the quantity of new trails and the quality of existing trails on this parcel, we also hope to increase public use and support. Park at the Justa Store, bring a dog or two, and enjoy the 2-mile loop! ◆
